

Scenario

 A potential debris flow/flooding on the South Coast was identified after multiple storms over several days in January 2023. On January 8, 2023 the National Weather Service forecasted a significant storm for the Front Country beginning January 11, 2023 that would push the soil saturation levels to trigger a possible debris flow.

Essential Personnel

- Essential Personnel are those staff vital to the operation and fulfillment of any of the Ten Campus Essential Functions (next slide)
- Estimated that 30% UCSB staff were unable to come to campus to work due to being physically blocked, evacuated, or for health issues during 2018 1/9 Debris Flow.

Scenario (After the Incident) Group Discussion

 On January 12th at 0300 hours, it was reported that a debris flow had triggered over the 192 near San Ysidro road in Montecito. Reports also indicated the 101 has been closed in both directions. The County of Santa Barbara has issued an emergency for the area. No reports of casualties but significant property damage to the areas hit by the debris flow







JANUARY 15TH 0800 – GROUP DISCUSSION

Information incoming:

• The 101,192 and 154 freeways and rail trains were shut down due to the debris flow. Caltrans is on scene and beginning clearing the freeway. There is not an estimated completion date.

UC Santa Barbara Key Issues:
